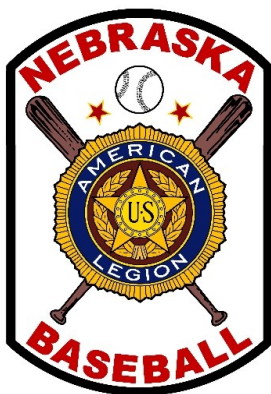

To inculcate in youth a better understanding of the American way of life and to promote the principles of 100% Americanism.

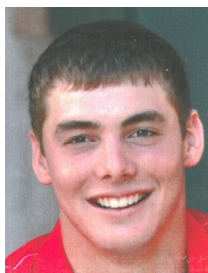

OFFICIAL RULES AND INSTRUCTIONS

The Department Athletic Committee, consisting of nine members, shall formulate rules and procedures, prepare tournament schedules, are responsible for area and state tournaments, and address all other matters dealing with this program. All games shall be played under the **2012 OFFICIAL BASEBALL RULES**, except as provided for in National American Legion Baseball Rules and as further provided for herein.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR TEAM MANAGERS/COACHES

“NEBRASKA AMERICAN LEGION BASEBALL IS BY INVITATION ONLY” Team managers and coaches should read these rules covering eligibility and playing regulations very carefully. All dates and deadlines mentioned supersede national dates and deadlines, and will be rigidly enforced.

[] 1. **HAVE YOU ENTERED YOUR TEAM(S)?** Initial Team Entry in the Program must be completed on or before May 3, 2012, using the National American Legion Baseball On-Line Registration System. After May 3, 2012, teams will not be allowed to register through the National On-Line Registration System. You will have to contact Department Headquarters for review and approval to participate. If approved, a **late fee of \$300.00 per team** will be assessed, payable to the Department of Nebraska. You will then be given steps how to register using the National On-Line Registration System.

[] 2. **HAVE YOU PAID TEAM REGISTRATION FEES AND OBTAINED GROUP ACCIDENT AND LIABILITY INSURANCE?** Fees that will be assessed will be Nebraska fees of **\$125** for each team, National fees of **\$50.00** for each Senior Team and **\$25.00** for each Junior Team, and SA Vandyke Insurance fees. These fees are non-refundable. Payment of above said fees is by **credit card only**. All teams participating in The American Legion Baseball Program must be covered by American Legion mandated Group Accident and Liability Insurance for the entire season. This insurance can only be obtained during the registration process using the National On-line Registration System. Cost will depend on whether you select annual or seasonal coverage. The National Deadline for paying registration fees and obtaining insurance is **May 15, 2012**. After May 15, 2012, a **late fee of \$200.00 per team** will be assessed

[] 3. **HAVE YOU NOTIFIED OFFICIALS OF CHANGES TO YOUR TEAM ROSTER?** All teams will be allowed to add or delete players and dual roster players on their team roster up to and including **June 15, 2012**. Changes to rosters will be done using the National On-Line registration System.

[] 4. **HAVE YOU OBTAINED CERTIFIED BIRTH CARDS OR CERTIFICATES FOR YOUR PLAYERS?** Teams are required to provide birth certificate cards or original birth certificates and a copy of their team roster to the Area Tournament Director by **Seeding meeting**. Failure to do so will result in disqualification from the tournament. **DO NOT MAIL THESE TO DEPARTMENT HEADQUARTERS!!** Birth

Certificate Cards can be obtained through Department Headquarters for \$5.00 per card, plus tax. **Certification of Birth Certificates will be done through Area Athletic Committee Representatives.**

SPECIAL RULES OF ENTRY DATES AND DEADLINES

Initial team entry (Application) into the Nebraska American Legion Baseball Program must be completed through the National On-Line Registration System by **May 3, 2012**.

Deadline for Paying all fees for team registration is **May 15, 2012**. Failure to meet the May 15, 2012 deadline may result in disqualification from competition in the Nebraska American Legion Baseball Program.

Transfer Form 76's, Form 77's, are available only on the National On-line system using the coaches log in. **Only form 76 will be utilized in Nebraska.** Print the form from the on-line site, fill it out, gain required signatures, and mail to Department Nebraska. Transfer Form 76's must be received by **May 31, 2012**. In order to Add/Delete players and indicate Dual Roster players the On-line roster must be used and must be submitted by June 15, 2012.

Form 2's will be obtained through the National On-Line Registration System. A Form 2 will be filled out and printed from the National On-Line Registration System (one form per player). The coach will then obtain all required signatures and mail one completed Form 2 (one per player) to Department Headquarters by **June 21, 2012** and keep one copy for their records. **Insurance** does **NOT** need to be mailed to Department.

Area/District team placements are published on the <http://www.nelegionbaseball.net> website. Final area/district assignments will be published by June 30, 2012. It is the coaches responsibility to check the web site.

The deadline is **May 21, 2012** for all umpires applying for State Tournaments and June 18, 2012 for all other umpires. Late umpire certifications will be handled on a case-by-case basis by the Nebraska Legion Head Umpire Liaison. Tim Riskowski @ 402-216-3328

1.00 — TEAM AND PLAYER REGULATIONS

1.01 TEAM CLASSIFICATION AND ENTRY:

(a) The Nebraska American Legion Baseball program is divided into three classes (Class A, Class B, and Class C), with a Senior and Junior age division in each class.

- Class A will consist of all teams whose school or combination of schools has a total enrollment of 600 or more.
- Class B will consist of all teams whose school or combination of schools has a total enrollment of 161 through 599.
- Class C will consist of those teams whose school or combination of schools has a total enrollment of 160 or fewer.

(b) Entry in the program must be done on or before **May 3, 2012**, using the National On-Line Registration System.

(c) Legion Posts, Towns or teams will not combine without written approval from the Nebraska American Legion Athletic Committee. Requests to combine must be in writing and sent to Department Headquarters. **Must be received by January 1, 2012.**

Class B and C teams that intend to compete for a Regional Tournament must declare Class A to Department no later than June 15th and compete in the Class A Senior Post Season Tournaments

1.02 PLAYER ELIGIBILITY:

(a) American Legion Senior Baseball competition in 2012 is open only to players born on or after January 1, 1993. (Any player born in 1991 is not eligible.) American Legion Junior competition in 2012 is open to players born on or after January 1, 1995 (A player born in 1994 must play Senior Legion Baseball.)

(b) Player eligibility, properly established with a primary team under the rules of Nebraska American Legion Baseball, will remain with that team throughout the player's participation. Exceptions to this rule are covered in Rule 3.05. Players will play for the Team where high school attended first, if no team exists will then play for the team closest parents domicile. Eligibility may be broken only by change in

legal primary residence of parents or legal guardian or change in legal custody of player. Rule 3.04 (c) also applies.

(c) Any player regardless of age or grade who participates in the Nebraska American Legion Baseball program will abide by all rules published in the Nebraska American Legion Baseball Rule Book.

1.03 ENROLLMENT: Records showing the total enrollment of grades 10 through 12, obtained annually from the NEBRASKA STATE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT, TAKEN THE LAST FRIDAY IN SEPTEMBER, will be used in determining classification of teams. Teams may opt to enter a larger enrollment class for tournament play.

(a) All teams must have a base school with one hundred percent (100%) of enrollment counted. The base school will be the school of the sponsoring post or community from which a team recruits **the majority of its players**.

(b) Should more than one team be recruited from a base school by two or more posts in the same community, the initially established program shall be the primary team. All players or transfers must tryout for the primary team. Such tryout must be held no later than **May 31, 2012**. The secondary team may only recruit from players cut in tryout from, or transferred by, the primary team.

(c) Should a post sponsor more than one team, the initially established team shall be the primary team. All players or transfers must tryout for the primary team. Tryouts must be held no later than **May 31, 2012**. The secondary team may only recruit players cut in tryout from, or transferred by the primary team.

(d) A Senior team and Junior team sponsored by the same Post may have different base schools (based on combination of schools involved) and may play in different tournament classes.

1.04 INSURANCE: All teams must be covered by group accident and liability insurance for the entire season. The American Legion coverage must be purchased during the team registration process using the National On-Line Registration System.

1.05 UNIFORMS: Teams must be in like uniforms to play American Legion Baseball. [**Penalty;** Players and coaches failing to comply with this rule will be ineligible to participate.]

(a) The American Legion Baseball embroidered patch insignia must be worn on the left sleeve or left chest of the uniform shirt or outer garment (silkscreen or other copy prohibited unless approved by National Headquarters utilizing the Emblem Usage Request Form). If the ineligibility of players that fail to have patches on their uniforms will result in forfeiture of a game, the game will continue without forfeit and the Head Coach of the offending team will be ejected and in addition, will serve a two-game suspension following the ejection. Patches are available through Department Headquarters for \$2.00 each, plus sales tax.

(b) The front of the uniform shirt may carry lettering that identifies the Post, town or sponsor which the team represents. A minimum of the Post # displayed on the jersey will be required starting in the 2013 season. Location and size of lettering should be in good taste.

(c) A number at least six inches high **MUST** be carried on the back of the uniform shirt.

(d) **Uniform Shirts will be tucked in at all times.**

(e) Wearing of the uniform must present a positive and professional appearance and image.

(f) No jewelry of any sort, to include non metallic items, may be worn during an American Legion Baseball game. The only exception is a medical alert bracelet and it must be taped down for the protection of the other players.

1.06 ROSTER LIMIT, COACH/MANAGER: All teams will be limited to 18 players. Only registered players and two adult coaches in full uniform of the team are permitted on the coaching lines. A non-Legionnaire may act as coach. A member of the sponsoring Post should be the team business manager.

1.07 DUAL ROSTER PLAYERS: Coaches may dual roster players between affiliated teams on both the junior and senior roster. Only three (3) players (Class A) from the Junior roster, five (5) players (Class B & C) can be dual rostered on the Senior team roster, and not to exceed the 18 players. Deadline for dual roster of players is June 15, 2012. Once Junior Post Season Tournaments start, Junior Players are locked into the Junior Program until eliminated. A Junior player that will be a Dual Roster player must be indicated as "DR" on the first name line of the both the Junior and Senior roster that is submit-

ted in the National On-line system. Coaches must ensure that the players name and the "DR" is listed on BOTH rosters.

1.08 DUAL PARTICIPATION: Teams or players registered to participate in the Nebraska American Legion Baseball Program may participate in other amateur baseball programs, subject to **prior approval from the Department Baseball Chairman**. It is important that dual participation will not in any way interfere with a player's responsibility to American Legion Baseball. Refer to Rule 6. D of the national rule book.

1.09 FIRST AID:

(A) Concussion/Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) Rule:

Coaches, Managers and Administrators and Tournament Directors:

1. (a) Must obtain a certificate of training from the CDC (<http://www.cdc.gov/concussion/HeadsUp/Training/HeadsUpConcussion.html>). **Certification must be done every 2 years.**

(b) Certificate is due to Department Headquarters no later than June 15th. The certificate is required to be on hand at every Legion baseball game and at all Post Season Tournaments and is an inspectable item by Tournament Directors at the Seeding Meeting.

2. Provide information to all athletes, parents or guardians of an athlete, on the signs and symptoms of a TBI, the risks posed by sustaining a TBI and the actions an athlete should take in response to sustaining a TBI.

3. Remove any athlete suspected of sustaining TBI from participation.

4. Notify the parent or guardian of any player suspected of having sustained TBI.

5. Notify the Department Headquarters utilizing the Umpire Ejection report, specifying date and approximate time of the injury suffered by the athlete, the signs and symptoms of a concussion or brain injury that were observed, and any actions taken to treat the athlete.

6. Any athlete who is reasonably suspected of having a concussion or brain injury, and is removed from athletic activity, will not be allowed to return to play/practice until written clearance to resume participation, signed by a licensed healthcare professional, is provided to Department Headquarters. (B) First AID: Each team must provide an adequate First Aid Kit as part of its equipment at all practice sessions and games. Aggressive treatment of open wounds or skin lesions should be followed. In particular, whenever a player suffers a laceration or wound where oozing or bleeding occurs, the practice or game should be stopped at the earliest possible time; and the athlete should leave the field of play and be given appropriate medical treatment. During practice, the athlete should not return to the field of play without containment of the injury. If, during a game, the athlete can be treated without undue delay, play shall be stopped until the athlete has received treatment and is cleared to play. However, if the bleeding requires extensive treatment, a substitute shall replace the injured player.

1.10 SPONSOR/CO-SPONSOR: All teams participating in the Nebraska American Legion Baseball program must have an American Legion Post as a sponsor or co-sponsor.

2.0 — GAME REGULATIONS

2.01 SCHEDULING: All teams will schedule their own season play. (A final list of all registered teams will be available on the <http://www.nelegionbaseball.net> website by May 21, 2012.

2.02 UMPIRES: Regular season games will use a minimum of one Registered and Certified Nebraska Legion Umpire. All post season umpires will be required to be registered and certified Nebraska Legion Umpires .

REGISTERED - ALB form and fees submitted to Department HQ.

CERTIFIED - Umpires who have attended an annual American Legion sponsored Umpire Clinic and Rules Meeting and Completed the Umpire Test.

ONLY REGISTERED AND CERTIFIED UMPIRES will be selected and paid by the Department Athletic Committee for State Tournaments.

2.03 MINIMUM GAMES: Teams are required to play a minimum of 10 regular season games by the seeding meeting date of Area Tournaments. Teams not having the minimum of 10 games will be seeded last in tournament. Mercy rule will be 10 runs after 5 innings of play in

7 inning games and 10 runs after 7 innings in 9 inning games (regular season). Post Season mercy rule see Rule 6.04.

2.04 TOBACCO OR ALCOHOL USE: The use of tobacco or alcohol by a player, coach, manager or umpire while on the playing field is prohibited. Any violation of this rule will cause the individual to be removed from the game. For the purpose of this rule, dugouts, player benches and bullpens are considered part of the playing field.

2.05 PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT.

(a) **Player helmets:** All players are required to wear a double-flapped ear protective helmet with a face guard while batting or on deck. Base runners have the option of wearing a helmet with or without a face guard. Helmets/face guards must meet NOCSAE (National Organizing Committee for Safety in Athletic Equipment) specifications and bear the NOCSAE stamp. Coaches should inspect players helmet periodically—safety first.

(b) **Catchers** are required to wear a safety helmet, throat protector and a protective cup. Any catcher's mask that does not have an extended metal or plastic throat protector of at least 2 inches in length is required to have an attachable throat protector. Umpires and/or tournament officials are instructed to halt any game until this rule is complied with. If the team fails to comply, that team will forfeit the game. Any person warming up a pitcher must wear an approved catcher's mask in or out of the bullpen. It is recommended that batters wear a protective mouth guard while batting.

(c) **Base Coaches** are required to wear a protective baseball helmet (with bill – no "skull caps") while coaching first or third base. Helmets are not required to have ear flaps. Players acting as base coaches are required to wear helmets in accordance with Rule 2.05 (a), facemask optional.

2.06 BATS: All non-wood bats must have an NCAA BBCOR certification. If any bat fails to meet this requirement, the bat shall be removed from the game, the batter shall be declared out and the head coach or team manager shall be ejected from the game. Only bats that are -3 (drop) will be allowed in American Legion baseball games. Bats used for warm-up in the on-deck area or in any other location; weighted bats, devices designed to attach to and remain part of the bat, such as weighted donuts or wind resistant foils are permitted. Sledge hammers, weighted pipes and other heavy paraphernalia are not permitted. Regardless of whether players provide their own equipment or not, the Coach/Manager is responsible for all equipment in the dugout or on the playing field. **Violation of this rule may result in multiple game suspensions.**

2.07 MINIMUM PLAYERS: A game shall be considered a FORFEIT if an opposing team is unable to or refuses to place 9 players on the field (this includes regular season no-show) and will apply to the Post season seeding meeting.

2.08 DESIGNATED HITTER: A hitter may be designated to bat for the starting pitcher and all subsequent pitchers (ONLY) in any game without otherwise affecting the status of the pitcher's in the game. A Designated Hitter for the pitcher must be selected prior to the game and must be included in the lineup cards presented to the Umpire in Chief. It is not mandatory that a hitter be designated for the pitcher, but failure to do so prior to the game precludes the use of a Designated Hitter for that game. A currently playing defensive player cannot be listed as the designated hitter. The role of the designated hitter is terminated for the remainder of the game when:

(1) The defensive player, or any previous defensive player for who the designated hitter batted, subsequently bats or pinch-hits for the designated hitter; or

(2) The designated hitter or any previous designated hitter assumes a defensive position.

2.09 PITCHING: No Senior player may pitch more than 12 innings or make more than FOUR appearances; or Junior player pitch more than 10 innings, or make more than THREE appearances as a pitcher in combining the total innings or appearances in any three (3) consecutive days. See Nat'l Rule (1.N), American Legion Baseball Rule Book. A pitcher who throws to one batter but does not retire him/her shall be charged with an appearance, but no inning. Example: 3 outs= 1 inning, 1 out = 1/3 inning. One pitch or more to a batter makes one appearance.

(a) Any pitcher may be removed as a pitcher and still remain in the game at another position. Any subsequent return to the mound

will count as another appearance. **If a pitcher is removed automatically by the second trip to the mound by the coach in the same inning, that player cannot return as a pitcher in that game.**

2.10 PROTESTS AND DISPUTES: All questions, disputes and protests within the state program shall be decided by the Department Athletic Chairman or Committee. The Department Committee shall have the power to disqualify or suspend anyone violating Department or National rules.

3.00 — PLAYER RECRUITMENT

3.01 ELIGIBLE PLAYERS: Posts may use players who are regularly enrolled in school prior to March 31 of this year. Emancipated players such as college or university students or players no longer in high school **MUST** play for the team last played for. If last team played for no longer exists then the player must play for team closest to parents domicile.

3.02 LEGAL ADDRESS: The mailing address of parents or permanent court appointed guardian is considered legal residence of player. Any player whose parents move and establish a new permanent residence after March 31 must submit a request to play with the team of his/her new permanent residence. **The request must be in writing, include a statement by the parents that the move is permanent, and must be filed with the Department Athletic Committee not later than May 31, 2012.** Player recruitment by Plan A "zoning" (National Rule 3) is not utilized in Nebraska.

3.03 NEW TEAMS: A new team is a team that has not officially registered to participate in the Nebraska legion baseball program for 5 years. *note: When this rule applies you do not separate the new team designation between Senior and Junior teams.

(a) If no team is recruited from the community of the player's legal residence or from the school he/she attends, then the player's eligibility is with the team nearest his/her legal residence regardless of class. The enrollment of the school the player attends must be added to the enrollment of the base school which this player is recruited.

(b) Non-base school players who were obligated to play for the team nearest their parent's legal residence as 9th grade students shall be grandfathered into the program they initially entered until they move or change schools. Players who are unable to complete their eligibility because enrollment expansion exceeds 5,000 may continue on the team for which they last played, provided that no new players are recruited from their school.

(c) In the event a new team is formed which is nearer to a player's residence, the player has a one-time option of playing with the team for which he last played or for the new team.

3.04. CLASS B & C (ONLY) ENROLLMENT – Rule 3.03 above is amended in the case of enrollment requirements for Class B & C teams, as follows:

(a) Although the player selects the team recruited from his/her legal residence, should the player attend a school other than the base school, ten percent (10%) of his/her school enrollment will be added to the base school enrollment.

This ten percent (10%) shall be counted only once per school involved regardless of the number of players coming from the non-base school so long as the number of players doesn't exceed the number of players from the base school. In the case of divorce where one parent resides outside of the recruiting area: if the parent residing in the recruiting area has and provides documents of legal custody, for the duration of the Legion baseball season, enrollment of players school attended will not be counted.

(b) **350 Rule (Class C Only):** If the teams total enrollment exceeds 350 without the ten-percent rule applied, that team will be required to participate in Class B.

(c) **NSAA Approved Coop Baseball Schools:** If schools are an approved NSAA coop school during the school year for baseball, players from coop schools could play for the base school in the summer and no transfer would be required. Enrollment from the coop schools would have to be counted by base school. Number of players coming from coop schools can not exceed the numbers from the base school. Schools that are not an approved NSAA coop school for baseball, would have to refer to rule 1.01 (c) for combining.

3.05 TRANSFERS: The transfer request form (Form 76) can only be obtained through the National Website by logging in as a Coach. The Form 76 will be filled out, printed, and all required signatures obtained and mailed to Department Nebraska no later than **May 31st**. A copy of the final approved Form 76 will be sent to the respective coach.

(a) A player who tries out for his/her eligible team and is cut, must, upon the player's request, either be transferred or be placed on the team roster and provided the opportunity to actively participate. All transfers requests must be received by **May 31, 2012**.

(b) A player who does not try out for his/her eligible team for whatever reason and who files a request may be transferred with the approval of the **team manager AND coach**, with final approval by the appropriate Department Athletic Committee Area Representative prior to being sent to the Department of Nebraska.

(c) A player who will transfer from one high school to another between spring and fall semesters, may request transfer to the Legion team that recruits the new school to be attended in the fall, providing that the **March 15 Nebraska Department of Education statutory transfer requirements** have been met to be eligible for participation in high school sports at the beginning of the fall semester. The transfer request (Form 76) will include documentation of the approved school transfer before it will be considered by the Department Activities Director. Enrollment of the last school attended by the player will be added to the new team's total enrollment. Class B & C only will count 10% of the enrollment of last school attended.

(d) Transfer requests will not be considered or approved if a team is left with fewer than 10 players on the roster (DOES NOT INCLUDE DUAL ROSTER PLAYERS).

(e) All players requesting a transfer to another team will be granted a **one-year transfer only**. Players must reapply for transfer each year.

(f) **In the case of transfers, player base school enrollment of 10/11/12 grades will apply to all players regardless of age or grade. See rule 3.03 and 3.04 (a).**

4.00 — CONDUCT

4.01 UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT: Any manager, coach or player who displays un-sportsmanlike conduct or discredits this program, in the opinion of the Department Athletic Chairman or his representative, may be removed from further participation in any American Legion Baseball competition as determined by the Department Athletic Committee. **Unsportsmanlike conduct incidents will be considered by the Department Athletic Committee during the selection of Area and State Tournament host sites.**

4.02 HECKLING: No player, coach, manager, or any person associated with any American Legion Baseball team shall abuse, heckle, or make uncomplimentary remarks to any player or team official. The umpire shall immediately eject any individual violating this rule from the ballpark.

4.03 EJECTIONS: Any player, coach or manager can be ejected from a game by an umpire for any of the following rule infractions:

(a) Use of tobacco or alcohol while on the playing field, benches, in the bullpen or dugouts.

(b) Use of profane language.

(c) Making unnecessary gestures in protesting an umpire's decision. (Only the team manager or coach may ask for a clarification of a rule, but never argue.)

(d) Throwing bats or other equipment.

(e) Making unnecessary gestures to fans or opposing players.

(f) Resorting to unnecessary roughness on the playing field.

(g) Any conduct by players, coaches or managers resulting in ejection will result in suspension from the remainder of that game and will serve a **MANDATORY one-game suspension the following game**, to include Area and State tournament games. Coaches or players will not be allowed in uniform or in the dugout during the suspension.

(h) Any player, coach or manager suspended from a game in tournament play by an umpire for unsportsmanlike conduct will be suspended for the remainder of the tournament unless reinstated by the Tournament Director. The Tournament Director's decision is final. (Rule 4.03(g) applies if reinstated by the Tournament Director)

4.04 TRAVEL: All persons traveling with American Legion Baseball teams are expected to conduct themselves in a respectable and responsible manner at all times. Any person causing an unnecessary disturbance at any time and not abiding by the rules will be immediately ejected from the ballpark. Any expense for damage incurred will be borne by the individual and/or the post serving as the team sponsor.

4.05 MALICIOUS CONTACT: (See National Rule 1.E): Any player who, in the judgment of the umpire maliciously runs into another player is automatically ejected and declared out. Malicious contact is ILLEGAL. The player is automatically removed from the Area, State Tournament (unless that player is reinstated by the Tournament Director or a representative of the Department Athletic Committee.) Rule 4.03(a) through 4.03(i) apply for ejections.

5.00 — TEAM AND PLAYER CERTIFICATION FOR POST TOURNAMENT ENTRY

5.01 ROSTER AND OTHER OFFICIAL PAPERWORK SUBMISSION: Each team will be required to provide the Tournament Directors (at the seeding meeting), Team Rosters, Form 2's, Transfer Form 76's (if any), CDC Certificate of Training for Brain Injury, two (2) 5X7 Color Team Photos, SA Vandyke Insurance Forms, Legion Birth Certificate Cards or Original Birth Certificates (if no card is obtained). Failure to provide said material may result in disqualification.

5.02. TOURNAMENT PLAY:

(a) All registered teams may enter the open tournament program. Junior competition ends at the state tournament. Teams may elect to continue participation in post-season tournaments if available and with the approval of the Department Activities Director.

(b) Teams that compete at the Class A Senior level shall be eligible for and registered with the National Tournament program. Due to the number of registered Senior Legion teams, Nebraska is represented in National Tournaments by TWO teams.

(c) The Class A Senior State Champion team and the Class A Senior State Runner-up will advance to Regional Tournament competition in the Region 6 National Tournament.

5.03 ROSTER CERTIFICATION: Roster certification will be performed at seeding meetings. Should any team be using ineligible players, such players will be disqualified. Any manager, who has any doubt as to the eligibility of a player, should contact his/her Area Athletic Committee Representative or Department Activities Director. The seeding meeting will be the last point to question or protest a player's eligibility.

5.04. BIRTH CERTIFICATES:

(a) Legion Birth Certificate Verification Cards are available through Department Nebraska and can be utilized in lieu of original birth certificates, once issued. The cards are accepted at Area, State and National Tournaments. The Birth Certificate Verification Cards remain valid through the entire American Legion eligibility of the player. Cards are \$5.00 each, plus tax, and can be obtained through the Department Headquarters. Original Birth Certificates must be validated and verified through the respective Area Athletic Committee Representatives before cards can be issued.

(b) Issuance of Birth Certificate Verification cards are based on the review of the original birth certificate by an Area Representative of the Department Athletic Committee or the Department Activities Director.

(c) All birth certificates must be **certified**, carrying the signature of the Director of the Bureau of Vital Statistics and the raised/official imprint of the state seal in which the player was born. Plastic billfold-size birth registration cards obtained from the Bureau of Vital Statistics are valid.

(d) The following **ARE NEVER ACCEPTABLE AS LEGAL BIRTH RECORDS:**

- Baptismal certificate
- Hospital certificate or records
- School certificate or records

(e) In case of foreign birth the player will present any certificate or document duly issued to the bearer by the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service or by the Department of State which shows the birth date of the bearer. **OFFICIAL** Birth Certificates or records

issued by a foreign country are acceptable when accompanied by an English Translation and notarized.

(f) A properly notarized copy of that portion of legal adoption papers showing the place and date of a player's birth shall be acceptable in cases of foster parents. **MAKE SURE YOU HAVE THE PROPER CERTIFICATION.**

5.05 TOURNAMENT ELIGIBILITY: Any player who does not have a Birth Certificate Verification Card or Certified Birth Certificate for presentation to the Tournament Director at the seeding meeting, shall be ineligible for all games in that tournament. Each coach and/or manager shall be responsible for carrying Birth Certificate Verification Cards or certified birth certificates for the team's players.

5.06 PLAYER AGREEMENT: A National Form 2 (Player Agreement and Parent's Consent and Release Form) must be completed by each player's parent or guardian, and be in the possession of the team's coach/manager at all regular and Post Season games. It is required that all player's have a completed form presented to the Tournament Director prior to the team's first appearance in the tournament. Those without a properly completed form cannot participate.

5.07 ADD/DELETE AND DUAL ROSTER PLAYERS: All teams will be allowed to add or delete and dual roster players on their team roster up to and including June 15, 2012. After June 15, 2012 Senior teams may replace players only in case of death. Junior teams and Class B & C teams will be allowed to replace seriously injured players up to the first game of the tournament provided a replacement is needed to maintain a minimum of 10 players. All requests must be in writing to Department Headquarters. If phoned in, the call must be followed up with a letter or FAX.

5.08 FALSIFICATION OF ROSTER: The Department Athletic Committee reserves the right to disqualify from further tournament competition any teams which falsified its team roster.

6.00 — TOURNAMENT PLANS

6.01 TOURNAMENT DIRECTOR: A Tournament Director may not manage, coach, participate as a player or umpire in any tournament in which he/she serves as a Tournament Director. All Tournament Directors will attend a mandatory meetings in June of each year and will be reimbursed mileage up to .22 cents a mile and up to a max cap of \$60 for hotel. (if 100 or more miles away from meeting site). Programs that fail to have the tournament director or representative attend the June tournament directors meeting, automatically forfeit that tournament.

6.02 TOURNAMENT REQUIREMENTS: The U.S. Flag will be flown during every tournament game and the National Anthem will be played or performed before every tournament game. All players will recite the "Code of Sportsmanship" preceding all first-round games and every championship game. American Legion tournament officials will wear their Legion caps at the tournament site. **ALL Area and State Tournaments will utilize tournament brackets as provided by the Department Athletic Committee ONLY.**

6.03 TOURNAMENT UMPIRES: Area Tournament Directors will submit to Department Headquarters a list of at least four competent umpires who will work the tournament games. (The Department Athletic Committee recommends that three umpires be required to work each game at area tournaments.) Approval or rejection of umpires will be made by the Department Athletic Committee. All tournament umpires shall be certified by Department Headquarters and have attended an American Legion sponsored umpire clinic/ rules meeting and take a test annually prior to working any tournament games. The Department Athletic Committee will furnish certified umpires for all state tournaments. Umpires will be reimbursed mileage of .22 cents a mile and up to a max cap of \$60 per night for hotel (if 100 miles away from site). Umpires will be required to double up in rooms at tournaments.

6.04 TOURNAMENT GAMES:

(a) Brackets will be provided by the Department and are to be the only bracket format used, tournaments must begin on Friday provided there is not a "play in" part of the bracket (7 and 9) which may be

played on Thursday. Allowances may be made for 9+ team tournaments, but requests to start early must still be approved by the Athletic Chairman.

(b) Class A Seniors will play double elimination, nine inning games in Area and State Tournaments. Class A Juniors, Class B and C Senior & Junior Legion teams will play double elimination, 7 inning games in both Area and State Tournaments and are not required to advance on to regional tournaments. The 10-run lead at the end of 5 innings will apply for seven inning games and 10-run lead at the end of 7 innings will apply for nine inning games.

(c) Class A Senior Legion teams will each have an area winner and runner-up. After the seven areas have been completed, the area winners and runner-ups will be split into two eight team State Tournaments. One called the National Division and the other called the American Division. The winners of each division will play a one game playoff at a designated tournament site to determine the Class A State Champion. See the back of the rule book.

(d) Class A, B and C Junior Area Tournaments and Class B & C Senior Area Tournaments will be double elimination, seven inning games, with the 10-run rule in effect after 5 innings and are not required to advance on to Regional Tournaments.

(e) Any game suspended (Rule 6.06) by the on-site tournament director will become a suspended game and will be completed from the point of suspension. When a game is suspended on one day and completed the following day(s), the pitcher will be charged for the innings pitched on that day. Any innings pitched by that pitcher the next or following day(s) will be charged to that next or following day(s). If a pitcher pitches 6 innings on day one and 3 innings on day two, following a suspended game, he may only pitch 3 additional innings on day three. One appearance will be charged unless there is a change of pitchers. See Rule 2.09 NE, 1. N and 9 J. of Nationals.

6.05 HOST POST: For **Class A Juniors, Class B&C Seniors & Juniors:** The host post concept will be followed in all state tournaments. In the case where a tournament host post qualifies for the state tournament as an area winner, the area runner-up will assume the Host Post position. The tournament host will, however, have the option of playing in the first round of play. (Area hosts may also exercise the option of playing in the first round of play only).

For Class A Seniors: State tournament seeding, where Area Tournament champion and runner-up seed to separate Class A state tournament divisions (American and National), the following applies:

1. If the state tournament host team finishes as Area champion or runner-up, that team will return to their host state tournament to fill the Area champion or runner-up seed in the bracket. The 1st or 2nd place team will fill the area champion or runner-up seed at the alternate site. The 3rd place team (loser of the semi-final round) will then be designated as the host post in the state tournament.

2. For areas 1 through 4, which utilize serpentine seeding for area tournaments: If the state tournaments host team finishes as Area champion or runner-up, that team will return to their host state tournament to fill the Area champion or runner-up seed in the bracket. The other 1st or 2nd place team will fill the Area champion or runner-up seed at the alternate state tournament site. The host team will then be decided by the best winning percentage of 3rd place teams amongst Areas 1-4.

6.06 SUSPENDED GAMES: Suspended games will be completed from the point of suspension, if a suspended game is played the following day, the teams can still play an additional two (2) full games. No Game will start past 11:00 pm. All tournament games will be played in full, subject only to the ten run rule detailed in Section 6.04. Any game stopped for obvious reasons by the chief umpire, shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension of the original game. The lineup and batting order of both teams shall be exactly the same as the lineup and batting order at the moment of suspension of play. A player who had not previously been in the game may replace any player.

6.07 DESIGNATED HITTER: See Rule 2.08

6.08 PROTESTS:

(a) There shall be no protests filed during tournament play that are based on judgment decisions of the umpires. All protests of player eligibility issues must be filed and taken care of by the seeding meetings, except when there is a discovery of fraud. When fraud is suspected, the eligibility protest and a written description of the alleged fraud must be filed immediately.

(b) Protests of rule interpretations during actual game conditions must be filed with the umpire-in-chief before the next legally pitched ball is thrown from the pitching mound.

(c) A protest fee of \$50 shall be posted with the Tournament Director at the time of the protest and the protest must be resolved before the game proceeds. The Tournament Director will immediately contact the respective Athletic Committee Representative to immediately resolve the protest. If the Tournament Director and Department Athletic Committee Representative upholds the protest, the fee will be returned. If the protest is denied, the fee will be added to Athletic Committee fund. The Tournament Director must submit a written account of the protest with in twenty four hours to Department.

(d) The Department Committee will not discuss protests with team coaches or managers until the formal written protest has been received from and explained by the local Tournament Director, and then only after a ruling on the protest has been made.

6.09 TEAM ELIMINATION: IF A TEAM FAILS TO PARTICIPATE IN A SCHEDULED GAME FOR ANY REASON, THE TEAM WILL BE ELIMINATED FROM FURTHER TOURNAMENT COMPETITION. Forfeiting a championship game will result in elimination from the tournament and the third place team will be named runner-up. If a team fails to appear for an Area or State Tournament or is disqualified from Area or State Tournament competition, they will be assessed a \$300.00 Post Season Tournament guarantee fee, payable to the Department of Nebraska. If fee is not paid, team will not be allowed to participate in the Nebraska American Legion Baseball Program the next season. Teams have until the seeding meeting to drop from Area Tournament competition.

6.10 End OF SEASON: The American Legion Baseball season is determined to be over for each individual team as they are eliminated from organized American Legion Post Season Tournaments.

8.00 — FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS OF TOURNAMENT HOST POST

8.01 AREA TOURNAMENTS: The tournament host will provide umpires, balls, ground rental, and pay all expenses of staging the tournament. The Department Athletic Committee will furnish plaques for the Champion and Runner-up in both Senior and Junior competition. Teams will pay their own expenses involved with participation in the tournament.

8.02 STATE TOURNAMENTS:

(a) General Information: The tournament host will provide balls, ground rental, and pay all other expenses of staging the tournament. The Department Athletic Committee will furnish and pay umpires for all State Tournaments, Senior and Junior and All Class Playoff. The Department Athletic Committee will furnish plaques and awards.

(b) The host post will pay all teams commuting to the tournament for each of their games \$30 a day per diem and 60 cents a mile one-way for each day they travel and participate in a tournament game. Distances will be taken from Mapquest.com.

(c) The host post will pay all teams staying at the tournament site 60 cents a mile one way for their original trip to the tournament site, and \$100 a day expense money for each day they are at the tournament site, until eliminated. Area champions who live within 100 miles of the state tournament site **will not** be authorized housing. Rule 8.02 (b) will apply to teams fitting into this category.

(d) Teams which lie outside of the 100-mile radius must state their preference of commuting to tournament games or staying at the tournament site prior to the first game of the tournament.

(e) In case of rained out games, the Department Athletic Committee will pay per diem and mileage expenses of teams participating in the tournament if the host post shows a loss on the complete tournament. Expenses will be paid for rained out games only.

(f) The host post will pay Department Headquarters a State Tournament financial award fee of \$1000.00, **payable within 15 days following the completion of the tournament.** Should the tournament host show a financial loss after completion of the tournament, a waiver of the State Tournament bid fee should be requested in writing to the Department Athletic Committee from the Post Commander. The waiver must show a complete financial breakdown of expenses and revenue with receipts and invoices attached.

8.03 ALL TOURNAMENTS. Coaches and Team Managers shall work closely with motel officials and conduct inspections of rooms prior to the departure, check-out, and release of tournament teams. Any expense for damage incurred will be inherited by the player, team or Post serving as the team sponsor. **NOTE: It is suggested that rooms be inspected before the visiting teams arrive.**

Starting 2013 Season: All Umpires for regular season must be registered and certified. During the regular season, where a certified umpire is not available the Home coach or TD needs to contact the Athletic Chairman for approval or the game is not valid and will not be counted at the Seeding meeting

9.0 — UMPIRES

9.01 – Reporting Ejections and Incidents: Umpires are to be vigilant in reporting ejections and incidents that occur on the field during the course of a game to the Department Activities Director as soon as possible. The Umpire Report of Ejections/Incidents shall be faxed to the Department within 24 hours and if no fax available, mailed immediately.

9.02 – General Instructions to Umpires

– Umpires, on the field, should not indulge in conversation with players. Keep out of the coaching box and do not talk to the coach on duty.

– Umpires on the field shall not use any form of tobacco or alcohol.

– Keep your uniform in good condition. Be active and alert on the field.

– Be courteous, always, to club officials; avoid visiting in club offices and thoughtless familiarity with officers or employees of contesting clubs. When you enter a ball park your sole duty is to umpire a ball game as the representative of baseball.

– Do not allow criticism to keep you from staying out of bad situations that may lead to protested games. — **Carry your rule book.** It is better to consult the rules and hold up the game ten minutes to decide a knotty problem than to have a game thrown out on protest and replayed.

– Keep the game moving. A ball game is often helped by energetic and earnest work of the umpires.

– You are the only official representative of baseball on the ball field. It is often a trying position which requires the exercise of much patience and good judgment, but do not forget that the first essential in working out a bad situation is to keep your own temper and self-control.

– You no doubt are going to make mistakes, but never attempt to “even up” after having made one. Make all decisions as you see them and forget which is the home or visiting club.

– Keep your eye everlastingly on the ball while it is in play. It is more vital to know just where a fly ball fell, or a thrown ball finished up, than whether or not a runner missed a base. Do not call the plays too quickly, or turn away too fast when a fielder is throwing to complete a double play. Watch out for dropped balls after you have called a man out.

– Do not come running with your arm up or down, denoting “out or safe”. Wait until the play is completed before making any arm motion.

- Each umpire team should work out a simple set of signals, so the proper umpire can always right a manifestly wrong decision when convinced he has made an error. If sure you got the play called correctly, do not be stampered by players’ appeals to “ask the other man”. If not sure, ask one of your associates. Do not carry this to extremes, be alert and get your own plays. But remember! The first requisite is to get decisions correctly. If in doubt don’t hesitate to

consult your associate. Umpire dignity is important but never as important as “being right”.

– A most important rule for umpires is always ‘BE IN POSITION TO SEE EVERY PLAY’. Even though your decision may be 100% right, players still question it if they feel you were not in a spot to see the play clearly and definitely.

Finally, be courteous, impartial and firm, and by doing so you will command respect from all.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE PROCEDURES

While risk of one athlete infecting another with HIV/AIDS during competition is close to nonexistent, there is a remote risk that other blood borne infectious diseases can be transmitted. For example, Hepatitis B can be present in blood as well as in other body fluids. Procedures for reducing the potential for transmission of these infectious agents should include, but not be limited to, the following:

The bleeding must be stopped, the open wound covered and if there is an excessive amount of blood on the uniform, it must be changed before the athlete may participate.

Routine use of gloves or other precautions to prevent skin and mucous-membrane exposure when contact with blood or other Body fluids is anticipated.

Immediately wash hands and other skin surfaces if contaminated (in contact) with blood or other body fluids. Wash hands immediately after removing gloves.

Clean all contaminated surfaces and equipment with an appropriate disinfectant before competition resumes.


Practice proper disposal procedures to prevent injuries caused by needles, scalpels and other sharp instruments or devices.

Although saliva has not been implicated in HIV transmission, to minimize the need for emergency mouth-to-mouth resuscitation,
